Palm Sunday

13th April 2025

Eucharistic Liturgy:
Thanksgiving of the People of God

We prepare for a procession with palms as we gather outside the church building

Presider: This is the day which the Lord has made.
Let us rejoice and be glad in it.

Sentence for Palm Sunday:

Hosanna to the Son of David!
Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!
Hosanna in the highest. *Matthew 21: 9*

Presider: E te whanau a te Karaiti / Brothers and sisters in Christ,
during Lent we have been preparing for the celebration
of Christ's death and resurrection.
Today we come together
to begin this solemn celebration in union with
the church throughout the world.
Christ entered Jerusalem this day in triumph,
a triumph that led through suffering and death
to resurrection and new life.
In faith and love, may we follow this Messiah,
the humble ruler, who comes riding on a donkey.

Let us pray together, saying:
**God of our salvation,
help us to enter with joy
into the celebration of those mighty acts
by which you have given us fullness of life;
through Jesus Christ our Redeemer.
Amen.**

We hold up our palm branches and palm crosses for the Prayer of Blessing:

Sovereign God, we praise you and thank you
for the acts of love by which you have set us free.
On this day, Jesus entered Jerusalem triumphantly
to suffer and to die,
and was greeted with branches of palm.
Let these branches be for us symbols of martyrdom
and majesty.

May we who carry them follow Christ in the way
of the cross which leads to life;
through Christ who lives and reigns in glory
with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever.
Amen.

Let us proceed in peace.

We process to the main entrance of the church, waving palms, and singing

There's a man riding in on a donkey

 And the palm leaves are waving a welcome

The procession pauses and we re-gather at the main entrance to listen to the Reading

Reading: Zechariah 9: 9-10

Hear what the Spirit is saying to the Church
Thanks be to God.

The procession then enters the church as we sing the next hymn; we place the palm branches on the floor at the front of the church, then take our seats

Refrain: **All glory, praise and honour
to you, redeemer, king,
to whom the lips of children
made sweet hosannas ring.**

¹ **You are the king of Israel,
great David's greater son;
you ride in lowly triumph,
the Lord's anointed one! [Refrain]**

² **The company of angels
are praising you on high,
and we with all creation
together, make reply. [Refrain]**

³ **The people of the Hebrews
with palms before you went;
our praise and prayer and anthems
before you we present. [Refrain]**

⁴ **To you before your passion,
they sang their hymns of praise:
to you, now high exalted,
our melody we raise. [Refrain]**

⁵ **As you received their praises,
accept the prayers we bring,
for you delight in goodness,
O good and gracious king. [Refrain]**

Presider: The peace of Christ rule in our hearts
The word of Christ dwell in us richly.

Sentence: At the name of Jesus, every knee shall bend,
in heaven and on earth and under the earth,
and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord,
to the glory of God the Father. *Philippians 2:10–11*

Collect: Jesus, when you rode into Jerusalem
the people waved palms
with shouts of acclamation.
**Grant that when the shouting dies
we may still walk beside you even to a cross;
for the glory of your holy name. Amen.**

Psalm 118:1–2, 19–29 (ANZPB)

- ¹ We give thanks to you O Lord for you are gracious:
and your love endures for ever.
- ² Let the house of Israel say:
‘God’s love endures for ever.’
- ¹⁹ Open to me the gates of the temple:
that I may enter and give thanks to the Lord.
- ²⁰ This is the gate of the Lord:
through which the righteous shall enter.
- ²¹ I will thank you because you have answered me:
and you have become my deliverer.
- ²² The stone which the builders rejected:
has become the head of the corner.
- ²³ This is the Lord’s doing:
and it is marvellous in our eyes.
- ²⁴ This is the day which the Lord has made:
let us rejoice and be glad in it.
- ²⁵ Save us O Lord we pray:
Lord we pray you to give us success.
- ²⁶ Blessèd is the one who comes in the name of the Lord:
we bless you from the house of the Lord.
- ²⁷ The Lord is God, and has given us light:
**with branches in your hands,
go forward in procession up to the horns of the altar.**
- ²⁸ You are my God and I will thank you:
you are my God and I will extol you.
- ²⁹ We give thanks to you O Lord for you are gracious:
and your love endures for ever.

The Great Thanksgiving

**The Lord is here.

through Christ your only Son.

You are the source of all life and goodness;
through your eternal Word

Who though tempted in every way as we are,

In him you have made us a holy people

Therefore we proclaim your great and glorious name,

**Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

On the night before he died,
he took bread;
when he had given you thanks,
he broke it, gave it to his disciples,
and said:

Take, eat, this is my body
which is given for you;
do this to remember me.

After supper he took the cup;
when he had given you thanks,
he gave it to them and said:
Drink this, all of you,
for this is my blood of the new covenant
which is shed for you and for many
for the forgiveness of sins;
do this as often as you drink it,
to remember me.

Therefore loving God,
recalling your great goodness to us in Christ,
we celebrate our redemption with this bread of life
and this cup of salvation.

Send your Holy Spirit
that these gifts of bread and wine which we receive
may be to us the body and blood of Christ,
and that we, filled with the Spirit's grace and power,
may be renewed for the service of your kingdom.

United in Christ with all who stand before you
in earth and heaven,
we worship you, O God,
in songs of everlasting praise.

**Blessing, honour and glory be yours,
here and everywhere
now and forever. Amen.**

The Lord's Prayer

As our Saviour Christ has taught us, we pray saying ...

**Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.**

**Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those who sin against us.
Save us from the time of trial
and deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours
now and for ever. Amen.**

We break this bread
to share in the body of Christ.
**We who are many are one body,
for we all share the one bread.**

The Invitation to Communion

Haere mai e te kāhui a te Atua,
tangohia ēnei kai rangatira a te Karaiti.
*Come God's people,
come to receive Christ's heavenly food.*

*Communion will be served at standing stations at the Sanctuary steps - all are welcome to receive the bread and wine at communion, (however please note that intinction, ie dipping the wafer into the wine chalice, is **NOT** permitted); although you are welcome to receive the bread only if you prefer, or to come forward for a blessing only.*

If you need communion served to you in your seat, please indicate to the servers.

Prayer after Communion

God of our salvation,
in this Eucharist you have renewed us
in your covenant.
**Help us to follow in the path of him
who came to open the eyes of the blind
and bring prisoners out of darkness.
Amen.**

The Lenten Wreath

Today we extinguish the sixth, and final, purple candle in the Lenten Wreath as our journey through this season has brought us to the beginning of Holy Week.

So now we anticipate Maundy Thursday, and the events which take us closer to the cross of Good Friday.

The Blessing

May Christ who calls you to take up your cross, give you strength to bear your own and one another's burdens; and the blessing of God almighty, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, be with you, and remain with you for ever.
Amen.
