

The Sermon

Thanksgiving for the Gift of a Child

In this liturgy Nicole and Francois give thanks for the gift of their child Luca (bringer of light) Jacobus Viljoen. This rite has no connection with Baptism, which is the sacrament of initiation into the church, the Body of Christ, but is an opportunity for thanksgiving.

The liturgy concludes with the following as the priest prays:

Our Lord Jesus Christ be with you to defend you, within you to keep you, before you to lead you, beside you to guard you, and above you to bless you. **Amen.**

The family responds:

All embracing God the hope of every generation, complete our joy by your presence; give us quiet strength and patient wisdom as we nurture Luca in all that is good, and true, and just. **Amen.**

We say:

May Luca learn to love all that is true, grow in wisdom and strength and, in due time, come through faith and baptism to the fulness of your grace, through Jesus Christ our friend and brother. Amen.

Let us bless the Lord. Thanks be to God.

The Affirmation of Faith

The Preparation of the Gifts

The altar is prepared, and the offerings of the people are presented as we sing the Offertory Hymn:

Now the green blade rises from the buried grain, wheat that in the dark earth many years has lain; love lives again, that with the dead has been: love is come again, like wheat that springs up green.

In the grave they laid him, love whom we had slain, thinking that he'd never wake to life again, laid in the earth like grain that sleeps unseen: love is come again, like wheat that springs up green.

Up he sprang at Easter, like the risen grain, he that for three days in the grave had lain; up from the dead my risen Lord is seen: love is come again, like wheat that springs up green.

When our hearts are saddened, grieving or in pain, by your touch you call us back to life again; fields of our hearts that dead and bare have been: love is come again, like wheat that springs up green.

The Great Thanksgiving

We remain standing, though feel free to sit if needs be.

Christ is risen!

He is risen indeed.

Lift your hearts to heaven where Christ in glory reigns.

Let us give thanks to God. It is right to offer thanks and praise.

It is right indeed, it is our joy and our salvation, holy Lord, almighty Father, everlasting God, at all times and in places to give you thanks and praise through Christ your only Son.

You are the source of all life and goodness; through your eternal Word you have created all things from the beginning and formed us in your own image.

When we sinned and turned away you called us back to yourself and gave your Son to share our human nature. You raised him to life triumphant over death; you exalted him in glory. By his victory over death, the reign of sin is ended, a new age has dawned, a broken world is restored and we are made whole once more.

In him you have made us a holy people by sending upon us your holy and lifegiving Spirit.

Therefore with the faithful who rest in him, with angels and archangels and all the company of heaven, we proclaim your great and glorious name, for ever praising you and saying:

Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

All glory and thanksgiving to you, holy Father; on the night before he died your Son, Jesus Christ, took bread; when he had given you thanks, he broke it, gave it to his disciples, and said: Take, eat, this is my body which is given for you; do this to remember me.

After Supper he took the cup; when he had given you thanks, he gave it to them and said:
Drink this, all of you, for this is my blood of the new covenant which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins; do this as often as you drink it, to remember me.

Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come in glory.

Therefore loving God, recalling your great goodness to us in Christ, his suffering and death, his resurrection and ascension, and looking for his coming in glory, we celebrate our redemption with this bread of life and this cup of salvation.

Accept our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving which we offer through Christ our great high priest.

Send your Holy Spirit that these gifts of bread and wine which we receive may be to us the body and blood of Christ, and that we, filled with the Spirit's grace and power, may be renewed for the service of your kingdom. United in Christ with all who stand before you in earth and heaven, we worship you, O God, in songs of everlasting praise.

Blessing, honour and glory be yours, here and everywhere now and forever. Amen.

The Communion

The risen Christ is in our midst, and so we pray

Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those who sin against us.
Save us from the time of trial
and deliver us from evil.

For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.

The priest breaks the bread in silence and then says:

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ. We who are many are one body, for we all share the one bread.

Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world, have mercy on us.

Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Happy are those who are called to his supper. Draw near and receive the body and blood of our Saviour Jesus Christ in remembrance that he died for us. Let us feed on him in our hearts by faith with thanksgiving.

All who are baptised are welcome to receive Holy Communion.

The sacrament is offered in both kinds (bread and wine) though feel free to receive only the bread. We do not, for health reasons, dip the bread in the wine. This makes it safer for us all.

Prayer After Communion

As we remain seated or kneeling, we sing:

He is Lord, he is Lord, He is risen from the dead, and he is Lord. Every knee shall bow, every tongue confess, that Jesus Christ is Lord.

Gracious God,
we have seen with our eyes
and touched with our hands
the bread of life.
Strengthen our faith
that we may grow in love for you and for each other;
through Jesus Christ the risen Lord. Amen.

The Ending of a Pastoral Relationship

The Vicar says:

Alister was called to serve, first as Transitional Priest-in-Charge of the Parish of Saint Matthew's Hastings, and then as Priest Associate of the Parish of Greater Hastings. Alister's time with us now comes to an end and he begins a new ministry as the Acting Dean of Waiapu Cathedral.

Alister says:

Over these past seven and quarter years I have shared in the life of this parish, administering Christ's holy sacraments, proclaiming and teaching God's word, sharing your joys and sorrows. I give thanks for our time together, and for the opportunity given to me to minister with you in partnership as my sisters and brothers in Christ's service.

As I lay aside this ministry as a priest on this parish, I thank you for your support and encouragement during my time with you. I am grateful for the growth and struggles, the surprises and opportunities we have shared. And I ask you to forgive me for the times I failed you.

We receive your thankfulness and offer our forgiveness. We are grateful for your guidance and your gifts.

The Vicar says:

Acknowledging the bonds we have built together, do you release Alister from this ministry with us?

We do, with God's help. We release you Alister from the ministry you have exercised among us and with us.

Will you respect the new relationship that now begins for Alister as he moves to Waiapu Cathedral and offer your prayerful encouragement as he begins this new ministry?

We will, with God's help.

Do you, Alister, release the people of this Parish of Greater Hastings from their relationship to you as one of their parish priests?

Alister says:

I do, with God's help. My sisters and brothers in Christ, I release you from our relationship that we may discover the new things God is calling us to. Alister hands over his licence as Priest Associate.

The Vicar says:

I accept back the licence that is both yours and the bishop's, and on behalf of Andrew, Bishop of Waiapu, and of the Anglican Church of Aotearoa New Zealand and Polynesia, and I bear witness to the words spoken – words of thankfulness, forgiveness, and release.

Alister hands over the keys to the Church buildings.

These keys are a symbol of the duties and the stewardship of the sacred places within this parish, as well as my entrée to them. As I relinquish them, I acknowledge that I may only re-enter these places in order to exercise priestly ministry at the express invitation of the Vicar.

The Church Wardens lead the following:

Gracious God, as Alister leaves us to begin another ministry we give thanks for the relationships we have built, new opportunities that have emerged, challenges we have faced, and the knowledge that we are a gift to one another.

We thank you for all that we have done, learned, and shared together.

We pray that Alister may continue to grow in grace and in the knowledge of your love, so that he may be a blessing to others.

Guide and strengthen him in the new ministry to which you have been called.

Alister prays:

Eternal God, by your power we are created and by your love we are redeemed; guide and strengthen us by your Spirit, that we may give ourselves to your service and live this and every day in love to one another and to you. **Amen.**

The Dismissal of the Community

Alister blesses us:

God the Father, by whose glory Christ was raised from the dead, strengthen you to walk with him in his risen life, and the blessing of God almighty, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, be with you and remain with you for ever. **Amen.**

The Vicar gives any notices.

Final hymn
