Drink this, all of you, for this is my blood of the new covenant which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins; do this as often as you drink it, to remember me.

The Invitation to Communion

Lord God, in this Eucharist which we have shared, you have spoken your word of life and nourished us with the mysteries of Christ's body and blood; bring us with all who have died in combat or through the injuries of war, to know the joys of heaven.

We ask this through Jesus Christ, who lived and died and was raised to newness of life, to whom be glory in every age and for eternity. **Amen.**

Give rest, O Christ, to your servants with your saints, where sorrow and pain are no more, neither sighing, but life everlasting.

And weeping o'er the grave we make our song:

Alleluia, alleluia. (from the Russian Kontakion of the Dead)

A brief period of silence is kept, then we light the third candle for the 'Future / Responding'

O God, our help in the past and our hope for the future, we thank you for all who have served in times of war and conflict; and we commend to your care the ones we love but see no longer – e nga mate, haere, haere, haere atu ra, moe mai i roto i te rangimarie – grant them your peace and let light perpetual shine upon them; let their memory inspire us to continue working for peace and to bring light into the dark places of the world. This we pray through Jesus Christ, our Lord and Saviour. Amen.

and do not let them be afraid.

Collect for the Armed Forces:
